Give the Gift of Education



This holiday season, consider adding "honor gifts" to your list of giving ideas. Honor gifts are donations you make in recognition of a friend, co-worker, or family member. Year-end Tax Planning?

Year-end tax planning is just around the corner! The Montana Endowment Tax Credit (METC) is a great tool to have as part of your tax planning. The METC allows donors to pay less in Montana state income taxes when they give a qualifying planned gift to a qualified Montana charitable endowment. The incentive is 40% of the gift's federal charitable deduction, up to a maximum \$10,000 tax credit per year, per individual, and a credit of 20% of a direct gift by a qualified business, up to a maximum of \$10,000 per year.

The Education Foundation is able to assist donors interested in establishing planned gifts. Also, the Foundation has several endowment funds to benefit students and classrooms currently set-up for donors to make planned gifts to.

Classroom Grants Corner

Julie Blakeslee, elementary music teacher, was awarded \$1,000 in April 2013 for her grant, "Big Recorders, Big Learning, Big Fun!" The purpose of the grant is to purchase alto, tenor, and bass recorders for students in 4th-6th grade at Boulder and Meadowlark Elementary schools, as well as have available for other other music teachers in the district. By having alto, tenor, and bass recorders, students will be given an opportunity to play and hear melody and harmony on an instrument. Different voices of recorders help to differentiate learning, as well. Students who need a challenge can play a countermelody on the alto, or transpose a known soprano melody to the alto. For students in General Music, this is a great opportunity to provide musical understanding through performance on an instrument. Also, students who are uncomfortable with their voices can transfer a part to a recorder, and still be valued by their peers as an active participant in the group without sacrificing their comfort level. Most importantly, having more access to "special" instruments increases confidence and the feeling of importance to students.
